

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# Bribie Island a safe holiday destination

Bribie Island is connected to the mainland by a bridge across the Pumicestone Passage and has been a holiday destination since the early 1900s and has maintained its traditional sea-side charm.

Coungeau House is a five minute stroll to the Jetty along the Pumicestone Passage Esplanade where there are cafes, playgrounds and safe family beaches with white sand and calm water.

There are over five kms of walks and bike paths that follow the Pumicestone Passage on Bribie Island. The walkway under the Bridge opens up Sylvan Beach Esplanade with its many playgrounds and fishing spots.

Fishing from the Jetty or along the foreshore is a must-do activity and the fascinating *Seaside* Museum, south from the Jetty at South Esplanade, has displays about the history of Bribie Island and interactive activities for children.

*Buckley's Hole Conservation Park* bird sanctuary, at the southern tip of Bribie, is a haven for migratory birds and the tidal wash leaves behind many shells and mysterious sea creatures to investigate.

The walk from South Esplanade to Red Beach is unique as this is where the waters of the bay intersects with the Passage. Another great fishing spot.

Woorim, Bribie's 'surf' beach is five kms from the jetty along First Avenue and is patrolled by the Bribie Surf Club. 4WD vehicles can drive to WW2 Fort Bribie along the beach towards Caloundra. More World War 2 relics can be found at Rotary Park at Eighth Avenue.

For bushwalkers, the 3.8km circuit of *Bribie Island Bicentennial Trails* begins at the Bribie Island Community Arts Centre on Sunderland Drive, Bribie Island. Sandy tracks branch-off the main circuit through eucalypt forests, paperbark wetlands, and even wallum heathlands.

The Returned Services Club, the Bribie Bowls Club and the Bribie Island and Blue Pacific Hotels cater for families, as do the many cafes close by Coungeau House.

Bribie has everything to make a holiday an enjoyable, fun and relaxing occasion.
